### Using a FIRST-THEN Board

What is it?

A **FIRST-THEN** board is a visual tool used to help provide a child with more information about what is going to happen next. It shows two pictures: a "First" picture, and a "Then" picture. By starting with just two steps, we give the child clear information about what is happening, and allow them to focus on what is happening now, and what will happen next.

**FIRST-THEN** boards can also be used to help motivate children. For example, start with an activity the child may not choose on their own (such as a craft), and follow it with a favourite activity (such as playing with toy cars). In this case: FIRST: craft; THEN: cars. The child will often be more motivated to participate in the first activity if they know it will be followed by a favourite activity. This is also a great way to introduce a new task, activity or event; by following the new activity with a favourite activity.

### Why should we use it?

- Provides visual information to support language
- Helps children to understand what is expected of them
- May help increase the child's motivation to participate in a task or activity
- Helps with transitions from one activity to the next, or from one location (classroom) to the next (outside)
- Prepares the child for using a visual schedule

#### How do we use it?

- You may wish to start practising by using the board with two favourite or familiar activities (for example playdough and cars)
- Point to and label the sequence on the board (FIRST: playdough, THEN: cars)
- Complete both activities, making sure the THEN step immediately follows the FIRST step.

- Keep the board visible while you are working on both activities, continuing to point and label as needed
- You may wish to use a timer to show when one activity finishes, and the next activity starts
